Building the Future

DCC @ Fishkill hosted a manufacturing summit on Nov. 1 in which education professionals from DCC, Arlington High School and Pine Bush High School collaborated with local industry leaders to assess strengths and challenges of existing programs and brainstorm ways to fill the growing demand for technicallyproficient, innovative workers in the field.

On the horizon, DCC @ Fishkill's 6,000-square-foot Mechatronics Lab is set to open next September. The space will serve as a hub for credit and non-credit students to train in various types of manufacturing, including mechanical, electrical, HVAC, and automation. This variety of offerings is essential as the future workers in this profession are diverse- from high school students to adults retraining or re-upping their skills.

According to Dan Barbuto, Assistant Professor of Electrical Technology, "The Mechatronics Lab is going to produce students who know electricity and mechanical linkages and robotics and automation. It's a combination of things so a technician who is going to get hired is going to be more versatile."



Think Jobs

DCC @ Fishkill hosted the 5th annual Think Jobs Round Table forum on Nov. 2, focused on educating the community on efforts to bridge gaps in Dutchess County's workforce while also expanding work and training opportunities for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. More than 40 private sector business and human services agencies attended the roundtable, where they heard presentations on the Neurodiversity Employment Network and the Americans with Disabilities Act, in addition to success stories of employers and individuals of all abilities.

DCC's Office of Workforce Development and Continuing Education also took part in the Forum. Laraine Kautz, Workforce Development Liaison at DCC shares her experience working with Think Jobs over the past six years, "Every year that I participate in this event I learn something new. It is exciting to be a part of a team that is educating and supporting employers to expand their workforce to include individuals of all abilities."

Dr. Houston comes to DCC from Westchester Community College (WCC) where he served as Dean of the School of Mathematics, Science and Engineering. He has been part of WCC since 2010. Prior to transitioning to the role of Dean in 2018, he held a tenure-track position in the Mathematics Department and served as Adjunct Coordinator, Assistant Department Chair and Department Co-Chair.

Strategic Visioning

The College held three strategic visioning and focus group sessions between Nov. 14 and 28, a crucial next step toward developing DCC's next Strategic Plan. The plan aims to be a true synthesis of ideas between administration, faculty, staff and students and pan outward to gather input from the Dutchess county community – including government, industry and K-12 stakeholders. "It takes all of us, DCC and the surrounding communities, working together to build our strategic vision. Center for Creative Leadership (CCL), Bill Passmore,
designed the framework for the process. Asked
what he thought our colleagues should know about
last month's strategic visioning and focus group
sessions, Bill said "the goal is for DCC's Strategic Plan
to be a collaboration of diverse perspectives that is
responsive to the needs of the College as well as the
broader community."

Completion of the Brightspace Fundamentals Certificate is required for training compensation. If you have been assigned your Spring classes, you should have access to both Brightspace and the Asynchronous Training Modules. If you have any questions or want to discuss your options, please contact the Teaching and Learning Center (TLC).

Face-to-Face Faculty: We strongly recommend attending either SUNY trainings or the Brightspace Introductory sessions on campus to familiarize yourself with the new system. If you have been assigned your Spring classes, you can start now! If you have any questions, please contact the TLC.

Dusting Off Our Glittery Red Boots

DCC's Performing Arts Program and Masquer's guild wowed audiences on the weekend of November 10 with Kinky Boots, an impressive resurrection of DCC's live theater productions after three years without a stage.

Kinky Boots, based on Harvey Fierstein's book of the same name, is an especially timely choice for a first performance following the pandemic-imposed hiatus. Dr. Jordan highlighted the story's "DEI themes of acceptance, appreciation, courage, empathy, grit and respect." He then added "The very diverse cast delivered a powerful performance to a packed opening night audience."

And audiences were all for it! In addition to an opening night packed with people eager to watch, more than 1,000 people attended over four performances, said Performing Arts Program Chair Tommy Costello. Faculty and staff who saw the musical described Kinky Boots as exuberant, electric, and interactive.

"You could see the three years of pent-up performance energy simply exploding on stage, and it was absolutely exhilarating!," said Holly McCabe, Associate Professor of Visual Arts. "The energy in the room was illuminating and the cast shined even brighter," Kaina Rivera, Director of Student Housing, echoed.
