

ONWARD AND UPWARD, CLASS OF 2023!

This year's graduating class celebrated their achievements at DCC's 64th annual commencement ceremony held at Majed J. Nesheiwat Convention Center on Friday, May 19, joined by an audience of around 1,600 guests including faculty, staff, board members, community leaders, family and friends, with many more attending from home by livestream.

The diverse group of students ranged in age from 17 to 67 and earned degrees and certificates from 48 different academic programs. Of the 865 total graduates in the class of 2023, 89 began in one of DCC's programs designed to strengthen academic preparation such as EOP, CSTEP and TRiO, nearly 48% earned a cumulative GPA of at least 3.2 and 15 finished with a perfect 4.0.

In her commencement address, now-retired Professor of English Jacqueline Goffe-McNish charged the class of 2023 to move confidently into the world using the skills they acquired at DCC: "You can communicate, you can think, you're a team player, you have a moral center, so use what is in your hand!"

Also speaking at graduation were DCC's Chair of the Instructional Staff Council Dr. Matthew Murray, President Jordan, Board of Trustees Chair Michael Dupree, and student commencement speaker Kyle Bredberg '23 in addition to Dutchess County Executive William F.X. O'Neil. The College awarded a posthumous degree for the first time this year for Melanie Chianese, who would have graduated with honors last fall. It was presented to her mother by Dr. Jordan, along with Vice President for Instruction and Learning Dr. Houston and Human Services Program Chair Lacie Reilly.

Think Ahead was developed in partnership with Dutchess County, as part of former County Executive Marc Molinaro's ThinkDIFFERENTLY initiative established in 2015.

Juneteenth: A Mini-History

First recognized as a federal holiday in 2021, Juneteenth – also known as Juneteenth National Independence Day, Jubilee Day, Emancipation Day (TX), Freedom Day and Black Independence Day – honors the moment when Union soldiers arrived in Texas in 1865 to announce the end of slavery, more than two years after the Emancipation Proclamation was signed.

County Executive William F.X. O'Neil, who signed a Proclamation on May 31 officially recognizing June 2023 as Caribbean American Heritage Month in Dutchess County, was also there to show his support.

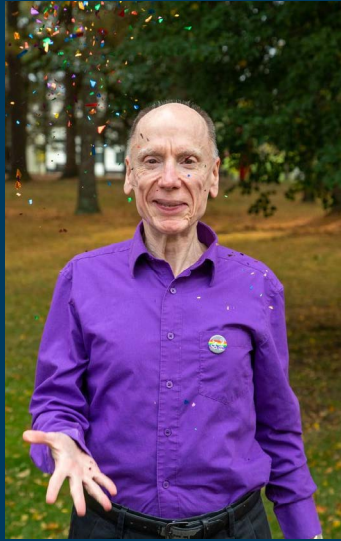

Leaving a (LGBTQIA+) Legacy at DCC



Chair of the Department of Performing, Visual Arts, and Communications/Professor of Speech and Theatre Joe Cosentino has accomplished many firsts throughout his career at DCC, making an impact that will live on long after his retirement in August.

He began in 1990 and immediately got to work increasing visibility of the LGBTQIA+ community on campus by directing the College’s

first plays with gay characters. In 2000, he pioneered the establishment of DCC’s associate degree program in the performing arts, which continues to be an inclusive space for students, faculty and staff.

For the past three years, Cosentino has served as chair of the faculty and staff LGBTQIA+ Ad Hoc Committee he helped create in 2017. In this capacity, he worked with the Registrar and Safety & Security offices to institute a name change policy for students, gave a workshop to faculty on incorporating LGBTQIA+ content into their classes and offered Ally trainings in addition to hosting events such as National Coming Out Day, Day of Silence Against Homophobia and Spirit Day Against Bullying. All of these efforts culminated in DCC being named one of the eight best community colleges in the country for LGBTQIA+ students by Campus Pride Index in 2021.

Looking back on his 33 years at DCC, Cosentino says he always felt very supported in his endeavors: “I am really proud of our College – that everyone has been so open, and that I’ve been able to contribute to the thriving arts and LGBTQIA+ community we have at DCC today.”

An Evidence-based Approach to Growth

DCC recently started working with a company called [Lightcast](#) to conduct an Economic Impact Study and Gap Analysis to help inform decisions about where to focus the College's resources.

Now in the data collection and review phase, the project is expected to generate useful insights and statistics that can be used to align program offerings with workforce needs and clearly illustrate its benefits for the region.

Vice President for Instruction and Learning Dr. Raymond Houston said, "We're looking forward to receiving the results from Lightcast. Having up-to-date, objective data is instrumental in assessing how well our programs line up with the needs of the community."

Vice President for Finance and Administration Adam Rathbun said, "College is an investment, not just for students and their families but also for taxpayers and the community as a whole. With the information we receive from the Economic Impact study, we'll be able to demonstrate how that investment impacts the region's development."



A College Stepping-stone



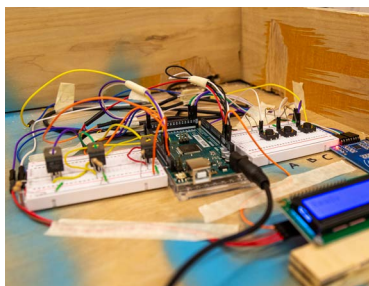

Completing the Circuit



A poster session was held in Taconic Hall on May 12 showcasing the work of six Electrical Technology (ELT) students. The projects, which fulfilled the final requirement for ELT 250 – the last course in the ELT program – demonstrated their practical understanding and technical skills acquired at DCC.

Chair of the ELT program Dan Barbuto was proud of the results saying, "Each student applied their learning to create something personally meaningful to them. For example, one student built an automated chicken coop to reduce the number of tedious and repetitive tasks involved in raising chickens."

Half of the students completing ELT 250 graduated in May while the other three have just a few classes left. Barbuto remarked that the employers who attended the session were eager to draw on the talent pool in the ELT program and stated, "They were ready to hire far more than six students. I have a list of about 30 companies that would hire them."

With the new mechatronics lab in DCC @ Fishkill set to open this fall, enrollment in the ELT program is expected to grow to meet this need!

The Gift of Education

Relationships – and building DCC’s network of support for students – were at the center of this year’s scholarship ceremony held at the Grandview in Poughkeepsie on May 17. After a three-year hiatus, the DCC Foundation’s annual Honors Convocation took place in a new luncheon format, allowing award winners to meet the generous people who helped fund their academic pursuits.

In his remarks, Dr. Jordan encouraged continuing and graduating students: “Take a look around the room at all of the people who believe in you and support your academic endeavors.” To the faculty, staff and outside donors in the audience Dr. Jordan said, “By engaging with and investing in scholarship, you open doors and pave the way for economic and social mobility, and your influence is felt throughout the entire community.”



This year, the Foundation awarded 168 scholarships totaling close to \$170,000 thanks to the altruism of its benefactors. Several of the awards are funded by current or previous members of the College – from the assistance provided by the Association of Women at DCC to the DUE scholarship established in honor of Allan E. Rappleyea, who served for decades on DCC’s Board of Trustees and as the College attorney. Other examples of gifts initiated by faculty and staff include the Academic Achievement, Diversity and Social Justice, and Transfer 101 scholarships.

Campus Notes



Enrollment Updates

Vice President for Enrollment and Student Success Scott Schnackenberg reported on June 12 that fall enrollment is up, for both new and returning students, compared to this time last year. The raw numbers show that there are 281 more students (+19.2%) registered in 3,681 more credits (+21.8%). Nursing students were registered earlier this year than last year, so adjusting for the difference, enrollment is up approximately 230 students and 3,150 credits. Fall applications are also up 557 (+20%) from last year, with the Chancellor's letter to all graduating high school seniors garnering 11 additional new applications last week.



Improved Retention in DCC's Residence Hall

More students will be returning to Conklin Hall next fall as academic success rates have improved dramatically. Director of Academic Housing Kaina Rivera reported that a significantly higher number of students met the eligibility requirements to return and that 131 have already committed to do so, compared with 96 this time last year. She credits growing retention numbers to expanded collaborations with other departments and increased one-on-one support for students. Rivera said, "My team and I are able to call on other departments for support and vice versa. This creates a well-rounded foundation for our students to be supported outside of the classroom that contributes to their academic success."



A View of the Future

The mechatronics lab in our DCC @ Fishkill location is set to open this fall. Adult Learner Open House

The Office of Workforce Education and Development hosted an informational event on June 8, inviting prospective students to learn about short-term credentials in healthcare, human services, business, tech and more. Marketing efforts resulted in 47 inquiries for programs such as Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA), Credentialed Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Counselor (CASAC), Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) and the Bookkeeping, Networking for the Cloud, and Cannabis Retail Management microcredentials. Chief of Staff & Vice President for Institutional Effectiveness Dr. Susan Rogers said, "Events like the Adult Learner Open House are so important as we continue exploring ways to serve the non-traditional student population. We plan to build on this initial success and conduct similar outreach in the future."

Ninety-one golfers participated, including President Jordan, who played his first ever 18-hole round.
