

New Direct Support Professional Programs Coming This Fall

As part of a statewide effort to improve retention and grow the direct support workforce, DCC has joined other SUNY schools in developing educational pathways that align with industry needs and provide opportunities both for incumbent workers and individuals interested in pursuing a career working with people with disabilities.

Starting this fall, the College will be offering three levels of DSP microcredentials composed of three classes and totaling nine credits each. Students will be placed in level I, II or III depending on their experience, and those new to the profession will be placed in internships to practice their skills. Tuition, books and fees for the DSP microcredentials are fully covered by funding from New York State, which [Governor Hochul announced in February](#), and students who complete one of the levels with a 2.0 or better will receive a one time \$750 bonus.

Additional assistance of up to \$2,300 may also be available to offset costs such as childcare and transportation.

Instructor and Chair of the Human Services Program Lacie Reilly says, "We anticipate up to 30 students will enroll in this program. Given the challenges of the industry, such as high turnover, low pay and demanding schedules, creating opportunities like this is essential. By removing financial barriers to education and incentivizing current DSPs, more people will be able to start and continue doing this important work."

A Triumphant Occasion: 108 GED Graduates Grace the Stage!

As you were leaving work on Tuesday, June 20, you may have noticed campus was quite a bit busier than on a typical summer evening. That's because DCC's High School Equivalency (HSE) program was holding its first graduation since 2019, and graduates, along with their friends and family members, filled the seats of James & Betty Hall Theatre to celebrate their hard-won accomplishment. It was standing room only, with students from both the English and Spanish programs at several locations, including Brewster, Fishkill, Poughkeepsie and online, receiving their certificates. Speaking at the ceremony were DCC's Vice President for Instruction and Learning Dr. Raymond Houston, who gave the welcome address, and President Dr. Peter Jordan who presented remarks, followed by the keynote speaker, former New York State Senator Sue Serino, who spoke about her own experience earning a GED diploma and going on to achieve professional success.

HSE students Iyshur Rashad (English) and Nora S. Villeda Guzman (ESL) also shared their reflections on the program, and thanked some of the DCC professionals who helped them earn their diplomas, including instructors Angela Bonanno, Julia Saquicela, Joel Henderson and Sandra McKelvey, ESL Credit Free Program Coordinator Kimberly Bacon, and Transition Coach Emma Slate. Rashad will be continuing at DCC this fall in our Criminal Justice program and Villeda Guzman is in the interview process to attend Vassar College.



VIPs in Action:

Board of Trustees Chair Dupree and Husband Receive Family of the Year Award

Michael Dupree has served on DCC’s Board of Trustees for more than eight years and given to the College far longer than that. Both he and his husband, Michael Fleischer, have contributed a great deal to DCC and the broader community since moving to Hyde Park in 1993 and earned a number of honors and distinctions for their philanthropy, including DCC Foundation’s Bridge to the Future Award this past March.

On July 13, the couple was presented with the Quality of Life Award at Family Services’ annual *Family of the Year Awards* celebration for making a memorable and positive impact on their Hudson Valley neighbors.

Asked about their devotion to the community, Dupree shared, “Both sets of parents taught us that you should be charitable if you can afford it, and for us, it’s not just about giving money. We also like to do the work.”

The family has been actively involved in a number of causes and initiatives throughout the

region for decades – from serving on the boards of local hospitals to spearheading beautification projects and, of course, investing in the future at DCC. Especially notable is their advocacy for year-round housing in the residence hall, which provides students with a safe place to live and get an education.

“It all boils down to helping young people,” Fleischer stated. “Higher education is at the very top of our list. The more educated people are, and the greater access they have to the arts and intellectual pursuits, the better society we will have for generations to come.”

Dr. Jordan said of the Dupree-Fleischer family, “They consistently demonstrate the core values DCC holds dear – collaboration, engagement, equity, innovation and excellence. Their immense support for DCC over the years has made a tangible difference in the lives of our students. We are incredibly proud and grateful that they are part of the DCC family.”

Accommodative Services

July is Disability Pride Month, honoring the anniversary of the day the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) was signed into law on July 26, 1990. At DCC, July is a critical time for students to connect with college resources – and the perfect opportunity for a refresher on our Office of Accommodative Services (OAS), a key support for students with disabilities, whether they’re matriculated or taking credit free classes.

The range of conditions protected under ADA is broader than many realize. Director of Accommodative Services Linda Bertolozzi explains, “A disability is defined as ‘a condition that substantially limits one or more major life activities.’ Students may not know that Lyme disease, long Covid, pregnancy complications and mental health conditions, such as depression and anxiety can qualify them for our services.”

The OAS values the opportunity to promote positive representation of disability and celebrate student achievement. They work to ensure equitable access to learning and college activities through developing strengths-based accommodation plans, which can include extra time on tests, the use of assistive technology, adjustments to the learning environment, etc. Some students may also be eligible for housing accommodations.

At the college level, the onus is on students to self identify and submit documentation, a very different process from the one recent high school graduates are used to. The OAS facilitates this transition, helping students feel comfortable, supported and informed. Additionally, since disability can affect students at any point in their college career, there’s no deadline to apply, though sooner is better!

Where Community Meets Opportunity: *DCC Alumna and Longtime Staff Member to Run for Mayor of Poughkeepsie*

Born and raised in Poughkeepsie, Yvonne Flowers has been an active member of the Dutchess County community for decades – both at DCC, where she worked in the Business Office for 33.5 years, and as Fifth Ward Councilwoman, first elected in 2009. On June 27, just months after retiring, she won a competitive three-way race to become the city’s Democratic mayoral candidate.

You may know her as a dedicated colleague, but did you also know that she started at DCC as a student? Flowers first heard about the College in 1989 through a TV commercial about our Bookkeeping Certificate program. A mother of two small children, she jumped on the opportunity to enroll – seeing it as a pathway to a well-paying job in accounting. Her experience here grew into so much more.

Throughout her time at DCC, Flowers says she was supported in reaching and exceeding her goals. From the beginning, Financial Services connected her with a work study position where she could apply the skills she was learning in her classes. After completing her Bookkeeping Certificate in 1990, she decided to continue on for her associate degree and was

encouraged by her supervisor to take a civil service test and apply for an accounting position in the Business Office, which helped launch her DCC career. She earned her Accounting A.A.S. degree in 1995.

Flowers credits the teaching she received as a student and mentorship in her professional life with keeping her focused and fostering her success. “I always looked at DCC as a second home,” she shared. “The community environment here on campus – in my office and in the classroom – got me through some very challenging

times and allowed me to step into leadership roles that helped boost my self-confidence, making me into the woman I am today.”

Flowers first entered local government to solve problems in her own neighborhood. Seeing the difference she could make on city council, she set

out on a mission to improve safety, quality of life and access to opportunities for the broader community. As someone who transformed her life through taking full advantage of all that DCC has to offer and devoted herself to helping others, Flowers is an inspiration and a testament to the power of a community college education.

Enrollment Updates

Vice President for Enrollment and Student Success Scott Schnackenberg reported on July 17 that fall enrollment is up, for both new and returning students, compared to this time last year. There are 403 more students (+19.7%) registered in 5,451 more credits (+23.2%). Given that this August's Aviation Maintenance Technician (AMT) cohort is larger and is fully registered earlier than last year, the adjusted increase in enrollment is approximately 390 students and 5,100 credits. Returning student enrollment (1,589) is also up 52 students from last year. Additionally, there are 3,753 applications for fall, 579 (+18%) more than last year.



New CSTEP Students Prepare for Success


Incoming freshmen enrolled in DCC's Collegiate Science and Technology Entry Program (CSTEP) began a six-week summer program on July 6 designed to help them acclimate to college life and build their skill sets. The students are in class Monday through Thursday mornings participating in two free introductory classes – math at 9 a.m. followed by biology at 10 a.m. Between 11 a.m. and 12 p.m., they receive a workshop on topics such as college skills, financial aid, stress management and more. Over the course of the program, they also work on research projects, which they present on the penultimate day of class, August 9.
