The Four P's of Strategic Growth

President Jordan concluded the "This is Our Future" town hall series on Dec. 6 with an inspiring discussion on Growth, weaving together all four lenses of DCC's 2023-28 Strategic Plan. After reflecting on the themes of the previous town halls, he introduced his Four P's—People, Programs, Partnerships and Physical Assets—as key drivers of strategic growth at DCC.

People—Dr. Jordan highlighted the importance of fostering growth for faculty, staff, students and the broader community. "You are our greatest asset," he said, reaffirming his commitment to professional development and supporting students socially, academically and professionally.

Programs—DCC's academic and career programs must align with student, community and industry needs. Dr. Jordan encouraged faculty and staff to adopt a "both/and" mindset, balancing liberal arts and technical skills. He highlighted the theatre department as an example of experiential learning, where students apply classroom knowledge to real-world projects.

Partnerships—Collaboration with schools, businesses, government and other institutions is critical to creating opportunities and expanding DCC's impact. Partnerships with financial supporters like the County Legislature are also pivotal for advancing DCC's mission.

Physical Assets—The Centers of Excellence model is central to strengthening DCC's facilities, technology and capacity. This approach ensures the College remains adaptable to the needs of students and faculty while increasing its visibility in the region.

Open Discussion—Dr. Jordan invited input on integrating additional dimensions of growth into the Four P's. Faculty and staff shared thoughts and ideas, including improving connections with students in Conklin Residence Hall, implementing an accredited ESL program, imagining the Centers of Excellence, and addressing staffing and scheduling needs, among other topics.

He closed the series by expressing his gratitude to faculty and staff for their engagement. "Thank you for everything you do, day in and day out, to make DCC the powerhouse it is," he said, reinforcing a shared vision for the future.



When we opened the Mechatronics Lab at the Center of Excellence for Business, Industry and Innovation in Fishkill last fall, the excitement was felt from Poughkeepsie to Washington, DC.

Now in its second year, the Lab has not only met but exceeded expectations, particularly in enrollment growth. The initial goal was to increase credit-bearing students in the Air Conditioning & Refrigeration (ACR) and Electrical Technology (ELT) programs by 12. Through focused efforts, DCC generated 91 inquiries and 16 new enrollments in spring 2024, bringing the total to 48 students. This fall, momentum continued, with 16 additional ACR students and 27 new ELT students enrolling, raising the total to 84—a remarkable 120% growth in just two years.

The Lab has also strengthened partnerships with local businesses like SonoTEK, The Gap, Ammega, and OnSemi, which host credit-free trainings at the facility, furthering its role as a workforce development hub.

For students like Nicholas Burachowski, an adult learner from Staatsburg graduating this May with an ELT associate degree, the lab has been transformative. "The Mechatronics Lab gave me the opportunity to learn new technologies, demonstrate equipment to visiting companies and make new industry connections," said Burachowski, who used these connections to secure an internship and prepare for a new full-time career.

High school students are also benefiting through the new Pathways in Technology (P-TECH) program, launched in August in partnership with Dutchess County BOCES. Designed to support at-risk students, P-TECH offers an accelerated STEM pathway, enabling participants to earn both a high school diploma and an ELT associate degree. Starting with 25 students, the program is expected to grow to 200.

"Up next at the Lab are new Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning (HVAC) Technology microcredential and degree programs, which may launch as soon as fall 2025," said Vice President for Instruction &



Learning Dr. Raymond Houston. "We've secured \$1 million through the SUNY Transformation Fund to purchase training equipment and support this expanded programming. Two Fishkill classrooms are also slated for renovation to house these new assets, which ACR students will use as well."

"This facility is poised to become the premier advanced manufacturing training hub of the Mid-Hudson Valley," added Dr. Susan Rogers, chief of staff & vice president for institutional effectiveness.

With over 20 years in cybersecurity and information technology across different industries, Sajed Naseem brings a wealth of experience to the role of chief information security officer (CISO) at DCC.

Most recently, he served as CISO of New Jersey Judiciary, working closely with the Supreme Court and IT department to drive enterprise-wide technology initiatives and protect critical data. In addition to his leadership roles, Naseem has been a faculty member at St. John's University for nearly 15 years, teaching both undergraduate and graduate courses on topics such as network security, cybercrime and asset protection.

Naseem holds a bachelor's degree in health sciences, along with two master's degrees—one in criminology from St. John's and another in technology management from Columbia University. Since 2017, he has collaborated with a research team at

MIT, focusing on human behavior and cyber awareness in the workplace. He has also moderated Supreme Court events such as "Artificial Intelligence and Cybersecurity" (2023) and "Technology and Mental Health" (2022). His insights on cybersecurity challenges in government operations during the pandemic were featured in Politico's 2020 article, "The Cyberthreat to U.S. Courts."

As a proud SUNY alumnus, Naseem says he's eager to strengthen cybersecurity at DCC and further its mission of fostering a secure and innovative environment for working and learning.

Fun facts about Sajed: He's working on opening an animal sanctuary in Pennsylvania that will care for goats, alpacas and small horses. A longtime basketball player, he once dreamed of becoming a sports broadcaster. He also considered going to medical school in Poland at age 17.

Record-Breaking Attendance at Fall Open House!

Our annual Fall Open House, held on Saturday, Nov. 16, set a new attendance record with 270 prospective students and 688 guests. This significant increase from last year's 205 prospective students reflects the hard work of our Admissions team and collaborative efforts across the College to highlight the opportunities at DCC.

Student feedback was overwhelmingly positive, with 87% of online survey respondents agreeing that the event made them more likely to consider DCC. Attendees also described the Open House as "welcoming throughout the whole experience" and noted that DCC offers "a great education without the college debt after."

Associate Dean of Enrollment Mike Roe thanked faculty, staff and student volunteers for promoting and participating in the event. "With such engaging faculty and staff, beautiful campus grounds, delicious cookies, wonderful student navigators and perfect November weather, the day was a huge success," he said.

"The Lightning Thief" Superpowers Neurodiversity

Rick Riordan, author of the celebrated "Percy Jackson and the Olympians" series, first imagined his main character when he ran out of Greek myths to share with his son. At the time, his son was being diagnosed with ADHD and dyslexia—traits Riordan wove into Percy's character. The result? A thrilling adventure series that reframes neurodiversity as a source of strength, showcasing the often-overlooked superpowers of those who think differently.

The DCC Performing Arts Program and Masquer's Guild Theatre Club brought "The Lightning Thief: The Percy Jackson Musical" to life in an energetic, celebratory rendition adapted from the book by playwright Joe Tracz. Held over the weekend of Open House (Nov. 14-17), the production drew over 800 attendees, including prospective students who had the chance to see their future peers in action.

"I loved being able to offer a piece that speaks to students in a different way," said Director AnnChris Warren, a part-time theatre instructor. "I believe part of what makes the Percy Jackson series so popular is it positively highlights the neurodivergent community. Young people who are on the spectrum in any way see themselves in the heroes of the stories, and that representation has lasting effects on them."

Warren also praised the inclusive casting opportunities made possible by the script's author's note, which emphasized that heroes come in all forms. "We also encourage you to look beyond traditional casting 'types," the note reads. "Above all, the characters in THE LIGHTNING THIEF are gods and heroes – and gods and heroes can look like any of us."

With its combination of dynamic performances, a meaningful message, and a spotlight on student talent, "The Lightning Thief" was more than a performance—it was a celebration of individuality, inclusivity and community.









Poughkeepsie High School Students Get Backstage Pass

On the morning before opening night, the inaugural Smart Scholars Early College High School Performing Arts Academy cohort visited DCC for a tour and an up-close look behind the scenes. The program, the first of its kind in New York State, is a collaboration between Poughkeepsie City School District, DCC and The Bardavon 1869 Opera House. It is designed to support students interested in pursuing a career in the performing arts after high school graduation.

The campus visit began with a group advisement session with Career Coach John Alley, who emphasized the wide range of career options for students in the arts. Professor of Theatre Dr. Thomas Costello then led the group

through a variety of opportunities and spaces DCC offers to students interested in music, dance, theatre and media production. The students were able to experience firsthand the resources and expertise available to help them succeed in their creative pursuits. Associate Dean of Instruction & Learning/Pre-Collegiate Programs Fred Herbst said, "It was great to see our future students on campus picturing themselves joining the DCC spotlight."

He plans to pursue a career as a lobbyist and is already active on campus, representing global politics in student government and participating in Model UN.



Dr. Boden Presents Civil War Findings

On Oct. 24, Associate Professor of History Dr. Michael Boden delivered a virtual presentation to the Dutchess County Historical Society, sharing insights from his sabbatical research. His talk, titled A Long and Fatiguing Campaign: The 150th New York Regiment in the Atlanta Campaign, May-September 1864, is a continuation of his successful series of talks on the role of Dutchess County in the Civil War.

Dr. Boden's latest findings reveal "an interesting link between a soldier killed in the campaign and 19th-century industrial and agricultural developments in the eastern half of the county."

Men's Soccer



Campus Notes ENROLLMENT Updates

As of Dec. 11, Vice President for Enrollment and Student Success Scott Schnackenberg reported that spring enrollment is up from this time last year. There are 2,286 students enrolled in 26,570 credits for the spring 2025 term-

182 more students (+8.7%) and 1,563 more credits (+6.3%) than we had last year. There are 148 new students enrolled compared to 135 last year. New student applications for spring are up 9% (768 vs. 706). Continuing student enrollment is up by 169 students (8.6%).

Winter enrollment is at 299 students in 881 credits, 24 fewer students and 80 fewer credits than last year. However, this year we have already done the bulk of cancellations, while last year's under-enrolled classes had yet to be canceled.

Looking forward, there are 1,413 applications for next fall, an increase of 6% over where we were last year. Applicants using the DCC application are up 12%, while those using the SUNY application are down 5%, so we are up significantly on our higher-yield applications.

Students Enjoy Pizza With the Prez

On Dec. 5, with finals just around the corner, students gathered for a casual lunch with President Jordan. The event offered the opportunity for students to share their experiences, ask questions and connect with the president over slices of pizza.



A Warm Escape from Finals Stress

To help students manage the pressures of finals and the winter season, the Counseling Center hosted two events on Dec. 3 focused on mental wellness and stress relief. In the afternoon, from 12–2 p.m. on the fourth floor of Hudson Hall, they co-hosted an event with Human Services interns aimed at relaxation and self-care. Students enjoyed activities like arts and crafts, Jenga to aid with focus, bubble wrap for "popping" out stressors, and an aromatherapy station, along with DIY face mask samples and easy overnight oats recipes for healthy Finals Week meals. Later in the evening, from 7–8:30 p.m. in Conklin



Hall, Human Services interns and the Active Minds Club co-hosted a student-led event to raise awareness about seasonal depression, offering gift bags with mental health resources and self-care products.
