Men's Basketball Team Earns No. 1 National Ranking

The Dutchess Community College men's basketball team rose to the top of the NJCAA Division III rankings and finished the regular season with an impressive 23-1 record (18-0 in Region XV). The team advanced to the post-season as the No. 1 seed in the Region XV Tournament, defeating Suffolk Community College 103-72 in the quarterfinal matchup on Feb. 25. Semifinal and final rounds will be held at Kingsborough Community College on March 1 and 2, and if they win, they'll head to Herkimer Community College for the NJCAA Division 3 tournament the week of March 17.

Led by Head Coach Robert Piano, the Falcons built their winning season on dominant defense and a talented roster, including sophomore standouts Joseph Battle, Prince Kamate, Quincey Platt, Seiray Sinerna, Alijah England and Amadou Diallo. "The players have bought into the defensive philosophy," Piano said. "We have been able to take teams out of their offense and stay disruptive."

Their success extends beyond the court. The team has also maintained high standards in the classroom, an effort that has not gone unnoticed. "The players have committed themselves to being model studentathletes, prioritizing academics and athletics," said Director of Athletics Matt Paquet. "Their success can be attributed to the entire college community providing support and resources that allow them to flourish."

As the regular season came to a close, the women's and men's basketball teams celebrated Sophomore Recognition Days on Feb. 18 and Feb. 20 respectively.

Empire State Service Corps Promotes Wellness and Student Success

This year, DCC launched the Empire State Service Corps (ESSC), a SUNY initiative providing students with paid service learning opportunities. Eight students are completing placements at DCC, focusing on wellness and mental health

As part of this work, ESSC members worked with the DCC Pantry and Clothing Closet to organize supplies, expand outreach and encourage student engagement. To raise awareness, they collaborated with faculty and staff on a

Students Gain Hands-On STEM Research Experience at Bard


Four DCC students participated in the **Project-based** Learning for Undergraduates in Microbial Mapping (PLUMM) Project, a new research partnership between DCC and Bard College. Over three weeks



during winter break, they worked alongside Bard faculty and students in state-of-the-art labs, applying microbial mapping techniques,

refining lab skills and analyzing data. As part of the program, the DCC-Bard PLUMM students also took a field trip to the New York State Department of Health's David Axelrod Institute in Albany, where they met with scientists conducting research in bacteriology, virology, wastewater treatment and other areas.

Funded by a \$34,000 Glenn W. Bailey Foundation grant, the project is led by Bard's Dr. Brooke Jude and Dr. Robert Todd, with Associate Professor of Biology Dr. Katherine Espinosa serving as faculty mentor for the DCC students. PLUMM aims to enhance students' lab, experimental design, data analysis and research skills, preparing them for STEM careers or graduate school.

Dr. Jordan's Town Halls Foster Open Campus Dialogue

n light of rising concerns about the influence of federal policies on our campus community, Dr. Jordan's Spring Town Hall series has emerged as a vital forum for supportive and direct communication between College administration and faculty and staff.

The first two sessions, held on Feb. 5 and 19, began with updates from the president on a range of topics—including capital projects, the development of the Centers of Excellence, and advocacy work in California and Washington, D.C. The floor then opened for discussion, allowing participants to ask

questions and voice concerns about everything from DCC's future to the potential implications of recent White House directives.

The resulting conversations were candid and collaborative, with participants focused on addressing the challenges of an uncertain higher education landscape while serving the needs and aspirations of our diverse student body.

Reflecting on his recent visit to Washington with other DCC leaders, Dr. Jordan shared one of his biggest takeaways: the broad recognition by senators and members of Congress of the key role community colleges play in uplifting citizens

and strengthening the economy. He also emphasized that we have solid support from SUNY and New York State, who back our mission and values as an institution. "In the midst of everything that we do, let's remember that our impact is really critical," said Dr. Jordan.

"Community colleges serve some of the nation's most marginalized students, and DCC is no exception," said Chief of Staff and Vice President for Institutional Effectiveness Dr. Susan Rogers. "As we face an unprecedented wave of federal mandates likely to



impact our students' education, it's crucial we come together as a community. The Spring Town Hall series provides one avenue for meaningful conversation around shared concerns, helping us to strengthen our resilience and reaffirm our commitment to our students."





"Even amid today's evolving federal landscape, under the leadership of Dr. Peter Jordan, DCC remains committed to transparent communication through our Town Halls—providing an inclusive space where diverse voices are heard, questions are welcomed, and feedback is valued as we work together to strengthen the impact DCC has on our students and local community while fostering a culture of belonging for all," said Director of Diversity and Compliance Felicia Ellzy-Smith.

With the next Town Hall scheduled for March 13, the conversation continues—providing another chance for leadership, faculty,

and staff from every corner of the College to come together and shape our collective future.



VIPs in Action

Advocating for DCC in D.C. and San Diego

This winter, representatives from DCC traveled to Washington, D.C., and San Diego to engage with national leaders, discuss key issues facing community colleges, and advocate for policies that support students and workforce development.

President Jordan joined Board of Trustees Chair Dr. Angela Flesland, Vice Chair Michael Dupree, and members Ibis Guzmán and Linda Pratt, along with Director of Diversity and Compliance Felicia Ellzy-Smith and Student Government Association President Rahim Sow, at the **Association of Community College Trustees National**

Legislative Summit in Washington from Feb. 9-12. The group met with Representatives Pat Ryan and Mike Lawler and took part in discussions with Senators Chuck Schumer and Kirsten Gillibrand. They also participated in meetings with officials from the U.S. Department of Commerce, the National Institute for Standards and Technology, the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the U.S. Department of Labor. Conversations focused on federal investments in workforce development, financial aid, recent executive orders, federal grants, the role of community colleges in regional economic growth, and how these factors will impact the college community and culture at institutions like ours.

Two weeks earlier, from Jan. 28-31, Dr. Jordan, Workforce Development Liaison Laraine Kautz and Academic Coach James Williams traveled to San Diego for the **American Association of Community Colleges Workforce Development Institute**. The conference focused on workforce trends, including the impact of artificial intelligence on our work and workforce, advanced manufacturing and strategies for strengthening industry partnerships. Speakers emphasized the need to integrate technical training with communication and problem-solving skills to prepare students for a rapidly evolving job market. Many of the ideas shared align with DCC's efforts to create credit-free to credit pathways, increase Credit for Prior Learning opportunities, introduce new programs, design an effective Learning Commons and build Centers of Excellence—initiatives that could easily be highlighted at next year's conference.

Representation Matters

Students, faculty and staff gathered Feb. 11 for the Black History Month STEM Panel and Networking Event, where five accomplished STEM professionals shared their career journeys, challenges and advice. The event, organized by Black History Committee members Assistant Professor of English Willie Morris (chair) and Assistant Professor of History Shalon Hallager in partnership with Workforce Pathways Coordinator Dr. Linda Haas Manley, highlighted the importance of diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) in the workplace and the impact of representation in leadership.

Morris led a dynamic discussion featuring panelists with expertise in a range of fields, including cybersecurity, civil engineering, healthcare, aviation and utilities: Sajed Naseem (DCC), Nicholas Vamvas (LaBella Associates), Marcus Paca (Nuvance Health), Keith Baskett (United Airlines) and Godwin Uwechue (Orange & Rockland Utilities). They spoke candidly about breaking barriers in their industries and working to expand opportunities for people of color in influential roles. Through their example and experience, panelists encouraged students to trust themselves, build confidence in their skills and stay focused on their goals. They also emphasized the need for resilience, drive and clarity of purpose in attaining professional success.

After the panel, students had the opportunity to connect one-onone with panelists, explore internship and career opportunities and speak with company representatives. These conversations reinforced the value of mentorship, as panelists continued to share insights and advice—underscoring the role of community, connection and advocacy in advancing DEI in STEM.

Manufacturing Pre-Apprenticeship Program Off to a Strong Start



In December 2024, six students completed DCC's first Manufacturing Pre-Apprenticeship Program, Measurements for Quality Control in Manufacturing, at the Mechatronics Lab in Fishkill. The program, which is supported by the Future of Work Center Hudson Valley Consortium of Community Colleges, the Future of Work Center at DCC, and SUNY Apprenticeship Programs, helps students build foundational skills for careers in manufacturing.

The course introduced students to essential manufacturing principles while also developing jobreadiness skills such as resumé writing, interview techniques and workplace confidence. Graduates earned an industry credential, enhancing their qualifications for apprenticeships and other industry opportunities.

"Mid-Hudson Valley manufacturers are looking for reliable, responsible employees, and those who have basic skills will be more in demand," said instructor Mike Sikula. "Many of these positions do not require a college degree but training and certifications are very desirable. These are not just jobs—they are career paths that can lead to financial freedom, personal satisfaction and opportunities for personal growth."

The next course begins April 7, with an open house for prospective students on March 18. No prior manufacturing experience or high school diploma is required.

Performing Arts Students Shine at Kennedy Center Theatre Festival

Sixteen students from DCC's Performing Arts (PFA) program participated in the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival (Region 1), held at Central Connecticut State University in New Britain, Connecticut from Jan. 28 to Feb. 1. Over five days, students engaged in workshops led by industry professionals, exploring all aspects of theatre production, including stage combat, performance competitions, auditioning techniques, dance instruction and lighting design.

Several students earned special recognition for their outstanding work: Orrin Dow represented the PFA program as an intern for the Design, Technologies & Management program; Frank Dominguez received an honorable mention from the Institute for Theatre Journalism and Advocacy program; Aaron Williams was named a semifinalist for the Irene Ryan Acting competition; and Gianna-Marie Torres was named first runner-up for the Region 1 Musical Theatre Scholarship Competition.

Accounting Program Recognized for Strong Transferability

DCC was recently **highlighted in The CPA Journal** for the strength of its accounting program's transferability within the SUNY system. The article examined the challenges community college graduates face in completing their accounting degrees and entering the CPA profession. Among regional community colleges, DCC stood out for minimizing credit loss in transfer—students typically lose only one course, compared to four or five at other institutions.

In short, DCC is making it easier for students to start their careers in accounting at the community college level, paving more equitable pathways into the field. Kudos to the DCC Business program for ensuring our students have a smoother, more affordable path to their accounting careers!

Instant Admissions Day Opens Doors for Poughkeepsie Students

DCC's admissions team helped more than 50 Poughkeepsie High School (PHS) seniors take their next steps toward college at an instant admissions event last month. Organized in collaboration with Poughkeepsie College Readiness and Workforce Education Counselor Kelly Semexant, the event gave students the opportunity to apply on the spot and receive immediate acceptance decisions.

"For many," said Semexant, "this was their first college acceptance. The excitement in the room was inspiring."

The event is part of DCC's ongoing partnership with the Poughkeepsie City School District to support college and career readiness. Last year, 143 Poughkeepsie seniors were accepted to at least one college, with 76 choosing DCC. This year, more than 75 students have already been admitted.

At the event, DCC Admissions assisted students with their applications, with Semexant helping to ensure their transcripts were prepared. Students also learned about scholarships and financial aid, and representatives of the SUNY Educational Opportunity Program talked about additional resources available. 
Weather Clears for Aviation Info Sessions

As of Feb. 19, Vice President for Enrollment and Student Success Scott Schnackenberg reported that there are 3,921 students enrolled for 41,644 credits for the spring term, 146 more students (+4%) and 759 more credits than there were last spring. We have 8 students more than the projected total

for the spring term, and it is the fourth consecutive term that DCC has had a significant increase. Looking forward to next fall, there are 2,233 applications, a 9% increase over where we were at this point last year.

Foundation Secures New Scholarships for Nursing and Human Services Students

Exciting news! The Community at Brookmeade, a nationally recognized leader in long-term care, has partnered with the DCC Foundation to establish two endowed scholarships, investing \$30,000 to support students pursuing careers in nursing and human services. The Brookmeade Nursing Scholarship will provide financial assistance to full-time students in DCC's nursing program, while the Brookmeade Human Services Scholarship will support full- and part-time students preparing for careers in care, advocacy and social impact. With \$1,500 awarded annually, these scholarships help ease financial barriers so students can focus on their education and career goals.
