



This is Our Future

On Oct. 11, President Jordan held the first of four town halls scheduled this semester, each focused on one of the lenses from DCC's 2023-28 Strategic Plan. The presentation, centered on the **Students** lens, took place in a packed Bowne 122, where faculty, staff and administrators gathered to hear his vision and engage in meaningful conversation.

Framing the discussion around our wildly important goal (WIG) of reaching 5,000 students by 2028, he emphasized the need to adapt and innovate in a rapidly changing higher education landscape while creating an inclusive environment that welcomes learners of all ages and backgrounds—from "cradle to cane"—to attend and thrive at DCC.







Dr. Jordan led an exercise that highlighted the diverse groups we serve at DCC, sparking a discussion on how we can better support these populations. The poll asked faculty and staff to identify groups mentioned in the presentation that they had not previously considered a focus for DCC. The results were as follows: Corporate Solutions (19%), Other (18%), Home-Schooled (15%), Youth Enrichment and Career Exploration (15%), Childcare/Lab Nursery (13%), Senior Education (12%), Neurodiverse Learners (7%) and Transfer-Oriented (1%).

The presentation outlined key initiatives to engage community members beyond the traditional transfer-oriented high school graduate, underscoring the value of lifelong learning. These initiatives include expanding youth enrichment programs, strengthening partnerships with P-12 schools and enhancing opportunities for adult learners. Dr. Jordan also introduced the concept of a University Center that would bring baccalaureate degrees not offered in the area to campus and discussed building on successful programs, such as our honors program, aviation.

Recognizing the vital role of our daycare and nursery programs in promoting early engagement, the discussion explored ways to connect families to the DCC community. One area identified for potential growth is our homeschool student population, which can benefit from access to college courses, workshops and extracurricular activities that facilitate academic growth and socialization.

Additionally, the president addressed how to improve our service for specific populations, such as veterans, seniors and neurodiverse learners, encouraging faculty and staff to consider the unique strengths and challenges of these groups. This collaborative dialogue aimed to identify ways DCC can create a more inclusive and responsive environment for all students.

The town hall ended with a call to action from President Jordan: to see future DCC students for who they are and to meet them where they are. He urged the College community to adapt policies, processes and practices to better serve students who have not yet been reached. "Our new students are already here," Dr. Jordan said, reminding us that from "cradle to cane," DCC must embrace diversity and evolve to become a truly student-ready college.

DCC's Arts Programs Steal the Show at Dutchess County Executive's Arts Award Ceremony

Arts Mid-Hudson presented nine awards on Oct. 2 at their 38th Annual Dutchess County Executive's Arts Award ceremony, and notably, at least four of the recipients are directly connected to DCC.

Dr. Thomas Costello, professor of theatre, received the Arts in Education award for his exceptional dedication to inspiring and educating students through the arts. He credits the recognition to the countless students, colleagues and artists he's had the privilege of collaborating with throughout his career.

Susanna Gilgert ('24), recipient of the Youth with Exceptional Promise in the Arts Award, graduated in May with two degrees from DCC: an AA in Liberal Arts & Sciences: Humanities and an AS in Performing Arts. Gilgert may be familiar to many as the national anthem singer at our 2024 commencement or as one of the Chancellor's Award winners honored in April. She is now studying classical vocal performance in the honors program at SUNY New Paltz.

This year's Arts Organization award was presented to The New Deal Creative Arts Center, with executive director and former DCC performing arts student **Teresa Gasparini** accepting the honor.

DCC's Human Services Program Named Among Most Affordable Associate Degrees for Social Workers in New York

NewYorkSocialWorkEDU recently spotlighted two-year colleges in New York that provide an affordable pathway for students interested in social work. The **article** emphasizes the significant value of completing a community college degree, contrasting the average tuition for a four-year program (\$52,752) with that of an associate program (\$11,310).

DCC stands out from the list of peer institutions for our below-average tuition, hands-on learning and diverse program options—including seven specializations from psychology, sociology and social work to child care, mental health assistant, chemical dependency counseling and direct support professional training.

"We're proud to provide an accessible and affordable pathway to social work through our human services program," said Instructor and Program Chair Lacie Reilly. "We take great pride in preparing future social workers and other professional helpers by offering a range of internship and community engagement opportunities alongside a rigorous and robust curriculum."

A collaborative art project by six U.S. veterans is on display between the main entrance of Washington Hall and the Mildred I. Washington Gallery through the end of October. Titled "The Other Side of the Door," the exhibit is a collection of shadow boxes that come together to form an American flag on the exterior, while the interiors visually depict the artists' internal landscapes. This project provides valuable insight into the experiences of military service members, revealing the challenges they face in reintegrating into civilian life and coexisting within their communities.

A reception was held on World Mental Health Day, featuring artists from Mental Health America (MHA) and DCC who shared insights about the creative process and the artwork itself. Veterans Resource Coordinator Stewart Dawes and art therapist Heather Harris, contracted by MHA, were also present to answer questions and discuss the project.

Among the artists is Christopher Fontana, a former Marine who served from 2010 to 2015. He first attended DCC after graduating high school in 2004, initially majoring in business before switching to psychology. Shortly after completing his military service, he earned his personal trainer certification through our microcredential program. Fontana is now pursuing an associate degree in human services and working toward his Credentialed Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Counselor (CASAC) certificate while serving as a peer advocate for Dutchess County.

He learned about the opportunity to participate in the project through Dawes, who has been his advisor since he returned to DCC in 2015. "The process was fun," Fontana shared. "Being able to sit there and talk to everybody about heavy things in a not-so-heavy way was great." He emphasized the importance of having people who understand and a supportive space to process and express difficult and traumatic experiences.

DCC currently serves 101 veterans and eligible family members, and our Veterans Resource Center is listed by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs as a Principles of Excellence program. This exhibit not only allowed veterans to share their personal journeys through art



but also gave the campus community a meaningful way to engage with and better understand and connect with their experiences.

That first year, she took a biology class, forging lasting connections with classmates who have gone on to high-level healthcare careers, including a cardiothoracic surgeon, an emergency room physician, an internist and two chiropractors. She credits DCC not only with preparing her academically but with teaching her essential study skills that helped her succeed in higher education. The achievements of her classmates, she says, are a testament to the College's role in shaping students' futures.

This strong foundation enabled Flesland to earn her bachelor's, master's and eventually her doctorate in nursing. Today, she serves as network director of Clinical Care Management for WMC Health and leads the DCC Board of Trustees. Looking ahead, Flesland is committed to ensuring DCC remains a vital resource for the community,

equipping students with the knowledge and skills they need to thrive in today's workforce. As chair, she plans to strengthen careerfocused programs in areas such as mechatronics and aviation while building on the strengths of the Emergency Medical Technician-Paramedic program to meet the growing

demand for emergency services in the Hudson Valley.

Inside the Family Partnership Center

Located just two miles from our main campus, the Family Partnership Center (FPC) in downtown Poughkeepsie plays a vital role in serving our community.

It's our hub for English as a Second Language (ESL) and High School Equivalency (HSE) programs (offered in English and Spanish)—two life-changing opportunities for many students. Completing these programs opens doors to new career and educational possibilities, including the chance to attend college at DCC.

In addition to providing pathways to DCC, the ESL program is also an excellent resource for current DCC students. It offers a range of levels, from beginner to advanced, with options to take



classes online or in-person, either at the FPC or The Center of Excellence for Industry & Innovation in Fishkill.

The DCC Foundation recently provided over \$10,000 in equipment and internet access to support students in these programs, ensuring they have the tools to succeed. In addition, the Foundation offers scholarships to cover tuition and fees, making college more affordable and accessible for students with financial barriers.

DCC CARES Receives Additional Funding

DCC students facing housing and food insecurity will benefit from increased support, thanks to Assemblymember Didi Barrett, who secured \$300,000 in the enacted New York State 2024-25 Budget, doubling the \$150,000 DCC received in 2022 and 2023. Assemblymember Barrett made the commitment to advocate for more funding after attending the DCC Foundations Bridge to the Future Gala this past spring.

Administered through the DCC Foundation, DCC CARES helps students stay on track academically despite personal challenges. During the 2023-24 academic year alone, DCC CARES served over 314 students, with 146 receiving emergency grants. The program also provided housing assistance payments to seven students and helped 36 others secure housing in DCC's residence hall. Read the full story here.

Counselor Luncheon: Is AI Our Educational Future?

On Oct. 4, DCC hosted the annual Dutchess County Counseling Association Luncheon, welcoming 35 local school counselors in an exploration of this year's theme, "Understanding AI in Education." During the event, Assistant Director of Admissions (Enrollment Communications Specialist) Xavier Velasquez demonstrated ChatGPT's potential applications in school counseling. Director of Instructional Technology and E-Learning Chrisie Mitchell and Professor Carolyn Rounds presented on the implications of AI in the classroom. Director of Student Financial Services Rob Zasso gave updates on financial aid, and Associate Dean of Enrollment Mike Roe shared what's new at DCC. Assistant Director of Admissions Michelle

On Oct. 10, DCC hosted a hands-on STEM event for Poughkeepsie Middle School students, featuring an exciting and sure-to-be memorable—"egg drop" experiment. Walk Out of the Darkness

On Sept. 28, a team representing DCC—comprised of students, staff, faculty, friends, and family—crossed the Walkway Over the Hudson during the Out of the Darkness Walk, an annual awareness event held by the American Foundation of Suicide Prevention. The DCC team raised \$700 in donations, nearly tripling their original fundraising goal, with most contributions coming from students. The College's Counseling Center, Active Minds Club and the Human Services and Behavioral Sciences departments played key roles in organizing and participating in the event. "The suicide epidemic is such a hard, devastating and emotional topic," said Hanna Perrault, a part-time

DCC counselor and event organizer. "Seeing so many people who are willing to engage in that uncomfortable conversation in an attempt to save a life was really powerful."







The Clothesline Project Raises Awareness of Domestic Violence

In recognition of Domestic Violence Awareness Month, Grace Smith House partnered with DCC's Mildred I. Washington Gallery to host an impactful exhibit by the Clothesline Project, a national movement dedicated to educating the public and supporting healing for those affected by domestic violence. Running through Oct. 25, the exhibit features hundreds of decorated t-shirts created by victims and their loved ones over nearly 40 years, each bearing a unique story of resilience and hope. DCC Communications and Media Arts students contributed a powerful video that highlights how the creative process aids survivors in coping with trauma,



while the DCC Counseling Center organized a tabling event on Oct. 3 to promote on-campus services and foster community awareness and support.

Mechatronics Lab Visit Sparks Interest in First Cohort of P-TECH Students

On Sept. 30, the Mechatronics Lab welcomed our first freshman cohort of P-TECH students—25 high schoolers from the Wappingers, Poughkeepsie, Arlington and Pawling districts—who are part of the Dutchess BOCES/Roy C. Ketcham consortium. These students will spend their first two years at Ketcham before continuing their junior and senior years at DCC. Assistant Professor of Electrical Technology Dan Barbuto led the group through a hands-on activity using DC Circuits equipment, giving them their first taste of applied learning. The students also had the chance to meet second-year Electrical Technology students, with whom they will collaborate in the motors and robotics labs, and explore various career paths in electrical engineering.



"When Dan opened the floor for questions, one student eagerly raised their hand to ask, 'When will we get to be hands-on?' That is what P-TECH is all about—allowing students to actively immerse themselves in an education that leads to a meaningful, enriching career," said P-TECH Liaison Briana Abbate.
