MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Friends,

DCC spent much of 2023 evolving to become an even greater asset for our community. Having launched a new strategic plan — with input from many industry, community and government leaders — we're broadening our role as an educational institution and economic driver. We're redefining terms like students, instructors and alumni. And we're reimagining our role as partner and facilitator in making the aspirations of our region's families, entrepreneurs and civic leaders a reality.

As you can see on the previous "At A Glance" page, DCC's importance to our region is substantial, yet we believe there is much more to come, guided by our strategic plan and four lenses:

STUDENTS — as we rededicate ourselves to developing lifelong learners and retaining local talent.

 ${\bf LEARNING}$ — as we align programming and curriculum to address societal and industry needs.

COMMUNITY — as we serve people across generations and socio-economic groups, as well as the education pipeline; and

GROWTH — as we promote individual and regional economic mobility and advancement.

It's at the intersection of these lenses that we can have the greatest impact. That is where collaborations and synergies occur. To that end, our five-year plan is filled with partnership opportunities, designed to benefit residents, businesses and municipalities throughout our region.

The first is our P-16 Initiative, designed to improve the education pipeline from cradle to career. DCC works with Dutchess BOCES, 13 school districts in Dutchess County, and three more in Putnam County to provide courses onsite that count toward high school graduation and add college credits. We now serve close to 2,300 high school students through these offerings!

We're also building a "P-TECH" program with Dutchess BOCES, Wappingers Central School District, and the Council of Industry. This four-year, school-within-a-school model will allow students to earn a high school diploma and an associate degree during their traditional high school years. It will accelerate their entry into the workforce and save them considerable money (see page 10).

We're strengthening university agreements and pathways to advanced degrees as well, providing similarly streamlined and cost-effective paths for students. These include transfer articulations with SUNY New Paltz, Marist College, and others on the horizon. We're also exploring onsite baccalaureate programs, through which we'll "import" degrees from partner schools. This would give students the ability to access specializations not offered locally and complete their four-year degree without leaving home.

Additionally, DCC is investing in our business community, resulting in powerful outcomes. The most recent is our new Mechatronics Lab in our Center of Excellence for Industry and Innovation on our Fishkill campus (see page 6). This facility's grand opening was held in October — with Dr. Jill Biden on hand for the celebration — and provides hands-on, cross-disciplinary training in four key areas: automation, electrical technology, HVAC technology and mechanical technology. With more trainings under consideration, we're positioned to be the Mid-Hudson Valley's premier advanced manufacturing training hub.

We also have our Center of Excellence for Aviation Education at the Hudson Valley Regional Airport. We recently welcomed our fifth Aviation Maintenance Technician cohort to begin this unique, high-demand program that is drawing job offers before students even finish. To date, 40 aviation maintenance technicians have been added to that industry with average starting salaries of \$65,000.

Our accredited Nursing program is also among our greatest points of pride. In fact, our first-time test takers achieved a very strong 93.6% pass rate on their most recent national license exam (NCLEX Q3 '23). Recently, we made simulation technology and equipment upgrades to our labs and added much-needed tenure-track faculty members. The high demand for LPNs, imaging technicians, and respiratory therapists by our healthcare partners tells us we must do more to support this industry, setting the stage for us to create a new Center of Excellence for Nursing and Allied Health Professions, which is just underway.

Of course, as an education leader, we understand that affordable, reliable, safe, quality childcare is critically important to most families' ability to attain in-demand and well-paying jobs. Thus, DCC is expanding its childcare and early childhood education programs and partnerships, to prepare more certified educators and expand the number of childcare slots available.

We also launched our new Direct Support Professional Microcredential program, which welcomed its first cohort this fall. It's the result of a partnership between the New York State Office for People with Developmental Disabilities and SUNY. This three-tiered program aligns with national certification standards, as students receive college credit that can be applied to a Human Services certificate or degree.

The most rewarding part of all of these initiatives is that we're already seeing results. In Fall 2023, DCC produced its first increase in applications and enrollment in over a decade. We enrolled 4,192 students — a 7% increase over 2022. This includes 1,607 new students, 240 more than last year — a 17.6% jump! Preliminary new-student data from other SUNY community colleges suggests that DCC has surpassed the median increase of 3.9%. We're also seeing increased interest among adult learners, in particular.

All of this is possible due to the cooperative efforts of community, industry and municipal leaders. They help us ensure the relevance of our curriculum, equipment, and technology which students learn, as well as the practical and applied learning experiences they need. Their commitments to economic and workforce development, guidance, and generous funding have all been critical in achieving these successes.

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Mechatronics Launches

DCC Opens New Lab with Help from First Lady

On Oct. 6, Dutchess Community College officially opened its new Mechatronics Lab in our Center of Excellence for Industry and Innovation with a very special guest in attendance. Dr. Jill Biden, our nation's First Lady and a longtime advocate for higher education, joined dozens of college and SUNY officials, along with numerous business, government and community leaders at the ribbon-cutting ceremony on our Fishkill campus.

Centrally located at the intersection of U.S. Route 9 and Interstate 84 in Fishkill, the 6,000-square-foot facility features state-of-the-art equipment and three labs focused on providing hands-on, cross-disciplinary training spanning four key areas of expertise: automation, electrical technology, HVAC technology and mechanical technology.

"This...will help students get the skills they need for the growing businesses here — preparing them for careers making everything from display screens to jet engines to semiconductors," said Dr. Biden, who was accompanied by U.S. Secretary of Education Miguel Cardona. "As a community college professor... I'm so excited to see how this work changes people's lives."

"It is critical that the Hudson Valley's dedicated workers have the skills and resources needed to secure high-quality, good-paying jobs in New York's booming advanced manufacturing industry. This...is the boost DCC needs to help students get the hands-on experience needed to fill in-demand jobs."

Mechatronics is the intersection of mechanical, electrical and control systems with computers. The new facility offers an array of programs, with credit-bearing and credit-free options designed to serve a broad student population. Those already working in the field now have the chance to gain new skills and credentials, while students without prior experience can acquire the technical proficiency needed to launch their careers.

Students can pursue DCC's certificate program in air conditioning/refrigeration and associate degree in electrical technology, in addition to short-term, industry-recognized credentials in topics ranging from pneumatics to robotics.

"This is a prime example of how DCC is working to meet the economic and development needs of our region and state, while also providing a pathway to gainful employment for our community members," said DCC President Peter Grant Jordan.

With more trainings to come, such as Certified Production Technician (CPT)-Plus certification and supply chain automation, the facility is positioned to become the premier advanced manufacturing training hub of the Mid-Hudson Valley.

"We are thankful for the partnership that secured funding for this state-of-the-art facility from Dutchess County and New York State investment through SUNY and Empire State Development (ESD)," SUNY Chancellor John B. King, Jr. added. "This is an exciting opportunity for students and adult learners to successfully gain skills for jobs across the region."

This is the latest in many partnerships DCC has with state and regional government entities, as the College reimagines its role as partner and facilitator in making the aspirations of our region's families, entrepreneurs and civic leaders a reality. These include DCC's Center of Excellence for Aviation Education at our Hudson Valley Regional Airport campus, as well as a new Center of Excellence for Nursing and Allied Health Professions, on which we are just beginning to work.

First Lady Jill Biden, Ph.D., joined DCC's students, faculty, staff and administrators, along with dozens of elected officials and community leaders, to celebrate the opening of DCC's new Mechatronics Lab in our Center of Excellence for Industry and Innovation.

"[ESD] is laser-focused on innovative and smart projects that will grow the economy and provide opportunity for all New Yorkers," said ESD President, CEO and Commissioner Hope Knight. "DCC's new Center of Excellence for Industry & Innovation is the perfect addition to the community and complements the many new companies that are moving into the Mid-Hudson Region. By strategically investing in workforce development — especially in advanced manufacturing — we are building a bright economic future for generations to come."

Commissioner Knight's excitement is warranted, as manufacturing jobs pay 12% more in hourly compensation than comparable workers earn in the rest of the private sector.

DCC has partnered with such companies as OnSemi, eMagin, and MPI to develop the lab's curriculum, and they will be involved in additional offerings in the Electrical Technology Associate of Applied Science (AAS) degree program and technical training. DCC is also working on expanding programs for middle and high school students, and students attending BOCES programs.

"I have two boys, 1 and 4. What I want more than anything — what I'm sure all of you want more than anything — is for our kids to have good-paying jobs that allow them to raise their families here in the Hudson Valley."

"We are proud to be at the forefront of advanced manufacturing - often called Manufacturing 4.0 collaborating with our government, industry and education partners," Dr. Jordan added.

The new facility also allows DCC to serve additional subsets of learners in our community: those coming out of high school who don't want a traditional college pathway, and slightly older students who are re-evaluating their career paths.

Dean of Academic Affairs Emerita Mary Louise Van Winkle has created a lasting legacy at DCC. Dr. Van Winkle, who passed away in 2020, had a significant impact on the life and work of faculty, staff and students throughout her 16-year tenure. As DCC's longest-serving Academic Affairs dean, she is remembered for her unstinting support, ensuring opportunities for personal and professional growth, encouraging the development of new and relevant courses and programs, and recognizing years ago the importance technology would assume in alternative modes of instruction delivery.

Regarding the latter, the Mary Louise Van Winkle Teaching and Learning Center (TLC) stands as a testament to her commitment as an educator to build on and move from "what is" to "what will be." Each of these areas could be considered pillars of her professional ethic. Together, they set strong precedents for initiatives that have continued to inform DCC's reputation for excellence.

Those who did not know Dr. Van Winkle can discover her values through the legacy she left as a member of the James F. Hall Legacy Society. The TLC is a symbol of excellence at DCC, providing faculty and staff the ability to expand their knowledge and expertise, and then pass that down to students while also using it to advance the College.

Her friends Jane Huber Yates and Sharon Rallis remember Mary Louise as the quintessential historian; her analytic, communication, problem-solving, research and writing skills made her their perfect friend and contributed to her distinguished academic career. Her legacy will continue as a powerful model for many young women she influenced through her volunteer activities, including serving on the boards of the Eleanor Roosevelt Center at Val-Kill and the Vassar Brothers Institute.

Dr. Van Winkle filled her early retirement years assuming interim academic deanships at Ulster Community College and Adirondack Community College. Her quest for new challenges then took her to Sitka, Alaska, where she served as chief academic officer for a year at a college whose student body consisted mainly of the Native Alaskans. Her final years back in the Hudson Valley were marked by engagement and participation in a range of activities, while always staying connected to DCC.

Mary Louise's many contributions to the lives of those with whom she was in contact, personally and professionally, will endure as happy memories of having known such a splendid human being. Ready. Set. **P-TECH!**

This summer, SUNY and Governor Hochul announced \$31.5 million in funding for 12 Pathways in Technology Early College High School (P-TECH) programs throughout the state. One is a joint partnership between DCC, Dutchess BOCES and the Council of Industry (CI), which together were awarded \$2.95 million.

P-TECH is a comprehensive, public and private sector stakeholder initiative which supports academically and economically at-risk students. This four-year, school-within-a-school model will serve at least 200 students when it is fully built out, each of whom will earn a high school diploma and a two-year associate degree during their typical four-year high school tenure.

"It's all about creating opportunities for our students," said Dutchess BOCES Superintendent Jason Schetelick. "When they get to cross the stage at graduation and receive not only their high school diploma but also a DCC degree, it can change the trajectory of their lives — especially first-generation students. If we can do that and positively impact Dutchess County industry, it's an even bigger win-win."

This accelerates their entry into the workforce and their ability to contribute to our economy sooner. It also reduces their cost of higher education and minimizes their college debt — which is quite a value-proposition to the average 18-year-old and their family.

"This is an incredible opportunity for our region as a whole," added DCC President Peter Jordan. "The world of work is evolving rapidly, and programs like P-TECH empower education and industry to collaborate and serve the needs of students and the broader community."

Given the demand for qualified workers in Dutchess County's manufacturing industry, the group anticipates that P-TECH will play an important role in ensuring the talent pool grows to meet the need. Planning for the program will take place over the 2023-24 academic year, with a launch planned for some time in 2025.

Enrollment Up-Up-Updates!

We are pleased to report that, as of our census date, DCC's fall enrollment was up for both new and returning students. This fall, DCC produced its first increase in applications and enrollment in over a decade. Nearly 4,200 students enrolled — a 7% increase over the prior year, including a nearly 300 net-student-increase. This includes 1,607 new students, 240 more than last year, which is a 17.6% jump!

Non-matriculated students also increased to 140, with 45 enrolled in new programs such as the Cannabis Retail Management and Direct Support Professional microcredentials. Furthermore, DCC is outranking other SUNY community colleges, according to preliminary new student enrollment data — far surpassing the median increase of 3.9%.

"This is the first time we have had an increase in enrollment in over a dozen years," said Vice President for Enrollment and Student Success Scott Schnackenberg.

DCC also achieved some success in addressing the equity gap. Its one-year retention rates among African Americans improved eight percentage points from the fall 2020 cohort to fall of 2021's, and their 56.6% rate was their second-highest one-year mark since 2013. Similarly, Hispanic/Latinx students' one-year retention rate improved by nearly two percentage points year-over-year, nearly three percentage points higher than their African American counterparts and within one percentage point of white students.

"Best of all, these increases haven't come from any one place. They've been incremental increases across the board from a host of initiatives," added President Peter Grant Jordan. "In other words, there hasn't been a magic bullet. It's been a measured, realistic approach — as it should be — and we congratulate all our hardworking colleagues who played a role in this accomplishment.

Vicki Haak '77 and Her Family Celebrate Her Father's Legacy

Mr. Haak was a mechanic/engineer, inspector and Westchester Aircraft Maintenance Association board member during his career.

"Our dad loved to tinker and had an aptitude for understanding how things work and how to fix them," Vicki shared. "He also loved to travel and learn about history. Working in aviation [gave him] a cohesiveness for all of these passions."

All four of his daughters became comfortable with flight and travel, which literally opened a world of opportunities to them.

"We all share a passion for learning and exploring, each with our own nuanced approach to weaving it into our professional and personal lives," Vicki added. "He always encouraged us to follow our dreams — and to change the oil in our car and swap out the kitchen faucet!"

At this year's Convocation luncheon, foundation donors got to meet with scholarship recipients and enjoy a meal together. It is always a very rewarding experience, as Vicki can attest.

"Meeting Sarandon and celebrating all the awardees was profound," Vicki said. "Our mom and dad instilled in us the importance of education — and of paying it forward. Knowing that our dad's legacy continues in such a worthy and measurable way is humbling."

"Mr. Haak loved what he did, and I could see that pride and passion reflected in Ms. Vicki's eyes when she talked about her dad's life and work."

She also developed a love for hard cider, a relative newcomer in the craft beverage industry, even though its roots date back centuries in the U.S. — including as a favorite beverage of presidents George Washington, John Adams and Thomas Jefferson!

"Cider's resurgence comes from our renewed interest in local food and agritourism, the craft beverage popularity, and the need for more gluten-free options," explains Flori. "Its lower alcoholic content also makes it "sessionable" (less inebriating), and its versatility makes it great to accompany many meals."

Flori soon decided to open her own business: Boutique Wines, Spirits and Cider in Fishkill, N.Y. Like good parents describing their children, she insists she loves all her products equally. Still, it's cider that makes her store unique: it's the only cider tap system in a New York liquor store.

Now, after nearly seven years in business, Flori finds herself among the thought leaders in her space. She was part of the lobbying effort to extend her industry's legal retail hours to 9 p.m. She's also dealt with changing regulations and navigated a pandemic and recession.

"Having our finger on the pulse of our industry, as well as the ability to pivot to a changing environment, has been paramount to our success," she states.

Yet, for Flori, all that is secondary. She thrives on knowing her craft, carrying forward a lifelong thirst for knowledge she refined at DCC. She decided to become a certified pommelier — hard cider's equivalent of a wine sommelier, or expert.

"The Certified Pommelier exam was one of the most challenging I've ever encountered!" Flori insists.

She must be a natural, however, because she was chosen a year later as the American Cider Association (ACA)'s East Coast Pommelier of the Year.

"Winning this award was mind-blowing!" reports Flori, who had previously been honored by the ACA as its Best Cider Retailer. "Being recognized for something you're passionate about is like the sprinkles on your ice cream sundae."

If so, then the accompanying publicity has been the whipped cream. It's been phenomenal for business, she says, and it's helped more people discover the hard cider category.

"This also helps us point folks to our local cideries, which are fellow small businesses and farms," Flori says. "We're spreading tourism dollars that stay in our community, which we're proud to do."

Flori truly appreciates her DCC experience. She returned to school as an adult, and DCC gave her class times that fit her schedule. She studied Business as well as Communication and Media Arts, both of which she still uses routinely.

"I feel the quality of the education I received is second-to-none," she advises. "I encourage anyone looking to start or continue their collegiate journey to strongly consider DCC!"

Alumni Highlight: Shoshana Akins, MPH

Shoshana Akins, '08, is helping to shape policies to advance the Biden-Harris Administration's equity goals. A DCC's honors program graduate and daughter of the College's Engineering Professor Leah Akins, she was appointed to the Advisory Committee on Transportation Equity (ACTE) by U.S. Secretary of Transportation Pete Buttigieg on Aug. 17.

Shoshana is one of 24 leading experts selected from an applicant pool of over 240 for a two-year term with the ACTE beginning this fall. The committee meets regularly to discuss and inform public policy, focusing on underserved groups and ways the federal government can better align infrastructure improvements with community needs.

In addition to serving on the ACTE, Akins is the manager of public participation planning at the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission in Philadelphia, where she has worked for over eight years doing outreach and urban planning specifically centered on civil rights and environmental justice policy. She says the role is a perfect synthesis of her interests in policy, public health and urban planning, and a true culmination of her professional and educational experiences.

Akins earned her bachelor's in Sociology and Journalism from Suffolk University and her master's in Public Health from Drexel University. As a Liberal Arts student at DCC, she worked on the College newspaper and laid the groundwork for her future scholarship and career.

Some of her favorite professors during her academic years were at DCC, and she cites her experience in those classrooms as key building blocks for her career. She specifically credits English Department Chair Joe Allen, who taught one of her most memorable classes (ENG 226), with helping her develop analytical skills and organize her thoughts into clear points — skills that continue to serve her well in her policy and advocacy work.

Onward and Upward Class of '23

This year's graduating class celebrated their achievements at DCC's 64th annual commencement ceremony held at the Majed J. Nesheiwat Convention Center on Friday, May 19. They were joined by an audience of approximately 1,600 including faculty, staff, board members, community leaders, family and friends, with many more attending by livestream.

The diverse group of students ranged in age from 17 to 67 and earned degrees and certificates from 48 different academic programs. Of the 865 total graduates in the class of 2023, 89 began in one of DCC's programs designed to strengthen academic preparation such as EOP, CSTEP and TRiO, nearly 48% earned a cumulative GPA of at least 3.2, and 15 finished with a perfect 4.0.

In her commencement address, now-retired Professor of English Jacqueline Goffe-McNish charged the Class of 2023 to move confidently into the world using the skills they acquired at DCC.

"You can communicate. You can think. You're a team player," she advised. "You have a moral center, so use what is in your hand!"



FALCONS HIGHLIGHTS Men's Basketball Qualifies for 2022-23 Nationals, Begins 2023-24 Campaign First in the Region, Ranked 8th in the U.S. The men's basketball team has been on a guite a roll over the past year. Led by Coach Rob Piano, they finished the 2022-23 regular season with a 17-14 record (8-4 in their region), won the Region XV tournament, and earned a trip to the Division-III National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Championships, which they entered with the #12 national ranking. Though they did not advance far, they met their goal of making it to the Nationals. This year, as the fall 2023 semester concluded, the Falcons were 11-2 with conference record of 8-1 and the #8 NJCAA ranking. They compiled a 9-0 record through November, ending the month ranked #4 in the nation. The Falcons' leading scorer is freshman Prince Kamate, who averages 13.8 points, 4.3 rebounds and 1.8 steals per game. Fellow freshman Quincey Platt is the team's second-leading scorer and top rebounder, averaging a double-double with 11.3 points and 10.2 rebounds per game. Platt also thrives on defense, where he blocks more than two shots and grabs 1.5 steals per game. Sophomore point guard Raesean Greer dishes out 5.3 assists per game and is the team's third-leading scorer with 9.8 points per contest. Freshman Seiray Sinerna leads the nation in shooting percentage at a 71% clip — mostly from inside the arc as a guard. Sophomore Nashuan Johnson and freshman Joseph Battle both average over eight points a game and have had huge games to help DCC get key wins. Women's Volleyball Makes Nationals for Second-Straight Year



DCC earned a spot in the D-III National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Championship Tournament and won the Mid-Hudson Conference for the second-consecutive year. The Falcons completed a grueling final week which had them competing in five matches, all of which they won, including a rematch of last year's regional final loss to Monroe Bronx, which they avenged. DCC then traveled to lowa for the national tournament, where they fell in their first matchup vs. number-one seed and eventual national champion Dallas College-Eastfield (35-0), which became the first team in NJCAA Division III volleyball history to go unbeaten and win a national championship.

The Falcons finished the season with a 24-6 record, including a 13-1 conference mark. They were led by sophomores Grace Ferretti and Lauren Seigel along with freshman Maya-K Johnson, all of whom averaged over 2.7 points per set, with Johnson's 3.1 leading the way. In addition, sophomore Nicole Spero averaged more than four assists per set and led the team in service aces. Classmate Kaitlin Robin finished second on the team with 3.5 assists per set while finishing among the top five in almost every statistical category. Freshman Franchelis Guzman led the team in digs as well as service receptions.

Siegel was named Mid-Hudson Conference MVP for the season and to the All-Region first team and All-Tournament Region XV team. Ferretti was named to the All-Tournament team as well, and to the All-Region second team. Johnson received an All-Region honorable mention, and Guzman was named Region XV defensive player of the year. Ferretti and Johnson were also selected for the Mid-Hudson Conference First Team.

Let The Games Begin!



DCC was thrilled to unveil its new eSports arena last spring in Dutchess Hall. It features a community space with room for anyone to engage in gaming, whether they play competitively or for fun, individually or on a team. Its equipment includes state-of-the-art computers, controllers, screens, gaming chairs and cameras. Players can also access it off-campus, making practice more convenient.

"We were looking to create a location not only for competitive eSports, but also for students, faculty and staff to engage in social and recreational opportunities," said Director of Athletics Matthew Paquet.

eSports is officially recognized and sponsored by the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA). More than 100 schools compete at this level, nationally. Student-athletes are required to meet similar academic and performance requirements as their traditional-sport peers do. There's also a great deal of preparation that goes into eSports competition, including staying physically and mentally fit.

After its launch, participants quickly got to work — in-person and online — preparing for matches against other colleges, nationwide. The DCC Valorant team held its first matches on Feb. 16, losing 0-2 to Trinity Valley CC, before winning its first match 2-0 against Heartland CC on Feb. 23. They recently competed in an in-person Valorant tournament at Contender eSports in Fishkill, against eight other two- and four-year colleges across the Northeast. DCC's program had 24 participants at the end of the fall term.

Outside of competition, the eSports Program hopes to partner with local high school teams and invite them to campus for competitions. The athletic department is also actively recruiting students to join the program and prepare for its spring 2024 season. Men's Soccer

Men's soccer finished the 2023 season with a record number of players earning individual honors. Aidan Yereance was selected to the Region XV Second Team, and Braden Pettigrew was selected to the Region XV Honorable Mention team. Alan Quezada was selected to represent DCC for the region's Sportsmanship Award. Yereance and Pettigrew were also selected to the Mid-Hudson Conference Second Team.



Women's Basketball

The Dutchess Women's Basketball team heads into the break with an 8-3 record in their first season of action in three years. The allfreshmen team is led by Alexis Ochoa-Pena who is averaging 16.8 points per game this season while also leading the team in per-game assists and steals. On the interior, the Falcons have two players who are putting up double-doubles every game in Maya-k Johnson and Shalanda Lefevre. Lefevre averages 12.8 points per game to go along with 11 rebounds while Johnson is scoring 11.4 a game with 12.2 rebounds. Franchelis Guzman had a big game against Borough of Manhattan Community College, where she put up a team-high 20 points in the win.

Award-Winning Historian Downs Delivers Timely Historical Revision of Modern Medicine

Lecture stressed how slavery, colonialism and war drove the study of infectious disease

Protecting the health of our communities relies on scientific insights many of us take for granted. How did the field of epidemiology develop, and why is this history relevant today?

Award-winning historian Jim Downs addressed these topics in his lecture, "The Troubled and Troubling Origins of Epidemiology: How Slavery and Colonialism Changed Medicine." His Sept. 14 address in the James and Betty Hall Theatre was the fifth event in the Dr. D. David Conklin Distinguished Lecture Series, established by the DCC Foundation to recognize the College's fourth president, who retired in 2014.

Dr. Downs is the Gilder Lehrman-National Endowment for the Humanities Professor of Civil War-Era Studies and History at Gettysburg College. He is the author of "Maladies of Empire: How Colonialism, Slavery, and War Transformed Medicine," which has been translated into Chinese, French, Japanese, Korean and Russian.

In addition to his other books, "Sick from Freedom: African American Sickness and Suffering During the Civil War and Reconstruction" and "Stand By Me: The Forgotten History of Gay Liberation," Downs has published essays in *The Atlantic, The New Yorker, The Washington Post, The New York Times, Vice, Slate, The Lancet, LA Times* and others. He is also a partner at History Studio, where he hosts podcasts on how to tell an authentic story.




First Lady, whose unwavering support for the U.S. troops included a rigorous five-week journey to the front lines of the Pacific theatre in 1943.

First Cannabis Retail Management Cohort Honored

New York's cannabis market is expected to generate \$4 billion over the next five years. In anticipation, SUNY awarded a three-year, \$1 million grant to the Hudson Valley Education + Workforce Consortium, a group of six community colleges which developed courses aligned with skills employers need. DCC Professor Mark Condon (Biology) and Assistant Professor Maureen Gittelman (Hospitality & Tourism) worked with the consortium and industry professionals to develop the curriculum and meet the demand.

Sixteen students — with interests ranging from retail to cultivation — went through DCC's new Cannabis Retail Management microcredential this past fall, and its inaugural cohort was honored at a December ceremony.

"The students...came from diverse backgrounds," Gittelman added.
"Some haven't been in a college classroom for 10 to 15 years — or ever
— but they committed themselves to the program and each other."

They included Angela and Stephanie Barone, a mother- and daughter-in-law duo who enrolled together. The family ran Hyde Park Brewing Co. for 27 years and received their adult-use cannabis license in April.

"As we were getting organized and thinking about opening our dispensary, we really wanted to get equipped with as much knowledge as we could," Angela said. "We want to be on the cutting edge and know the most up-to-date information."

"Since it's a new industry, we thought about how this certification could help us build our workforce," Stephanie added. "If I want my supervisors to take these classes, I want to know exactly what they're going to learn."

The program also strengthens one's network, as 59-year-old Timothy Mazyck discovered.

"I now have 15 new friends who'll all be involved in different aspects of the industry," he said.

The 13-credit microcredential develops skills in retail management, merchandising, storeroom operations, cost control, customer service and cannabis science. Its classes are streamlined to be completed in one, 15-week semester, with a schedule designed for working, non-traditional students.

"This is a great example of ways DCC and the SUNY system continue to innovate, finding new ways to collaborate with business and industry to develop programs that truly serve our community," Dr. Jordan said.



'Bring It On' Sets the Stage for DEI

You would expect a musical about competitive cheerleading to be full of pep and enthusiasm. Authentic, diverse characters who celebrate one another's differences? Or a positive, laughter-inducing story exploring complex subjects like race, body image and sexuality? Maybe not. But that's exactly what the DCC Performing Arts Program and Masquer's Guild Theatre Club did under the direction of part-time Instructor of Theatre AnnChris Warren.

The energetic production featured 'backbreaking feats of athleticism' and impressive dancing choreographed by Performing Arts alum Cedric James. The cast, a mix of first- and second-year DCC students from several different majors, was phenomenal.

The play itself spoke to inclusion, tolerance and building friendship across differences — motifs that are especially important now, when it's less and less likely those with differing views and perspectives will come together reciprocally or harmoniously."

The musical, which debuted in 2011 and introduced Broadway's first teenage transgender character, outdid expectations and drew over 1,200 attendees across four shows on the weekend of November 9. Brava!







Mildred I. Washington Art Gallery Hosts Kristallnacht Exhibit



Eighty-five years after the horrors of 1938's Kristallnacht — during which Nazis in Germany torched synagogues, vandalized Jewish homes, schools and businesses, and murdered close to 100 Jews — a multimedia installation of the same name opened in the Mildred I. Washington Gallery.

The exhibition, brought to DCC by Gallery Director and Professor of Communication Media Dana Weidman, tells the fictional story of a Jewish woman and Nazi soldier who meet on Kristallnacht, which translates to "Crystal Night" but has become better known as, "The Night of Broken Glass."

The opening reception was followed by a concise historical overview by Dr. Werner Steger, Professor of History and recipient of the Handel Foundation-Greenspan Trust Endowed Chair in Holocaust and Genocide Studies. A panel, featuring Dr. Steger, artist Dean Goldberg and journalist Rosemary Armao followed. It was a nuanced conversation between experts, exploring connections between the provocative work, the current political situation in the U.S. and recent atrocities in the Middle East.

A Middle States Milestone

DCC completed an extensive self-study review for its re-accreditation by the Middle States Commission on Higher Education (MSCHE), the College's official accrediting body, culminating in a notice of full re-accreditation in November.

The self-study was the result of two and a half years of hard work involving over 70 faculty and staff. The DCC team was led by Behavioral Sciences Department Chair Michael Hall; Chief of Staff and Vice President for Institutional Effectiveness Susan Rogers: and Vice President of Enrollment and Student Success Scott Schnackenberg.

Together, they facilitated the massive undertaking in collaboration with other members of the Self-Study Steering Committee, which culminated in a successful multi-day site visit from a Middle States team this past April.

"I am particularly proud of the degree of involvement we had across the campus," said Hall. "This was not an easy process and required a significant amount of work over an extended period of time. I believe it speaks highly of our colleagues and sends a message to the visiting team that the campus takes re-accreditation seriously."

We are thrilled to report that the College received full re-accreditation through the 2030-31 academic year. In addition, we were especially honored by Middle States' request to use our self-study as a template and point of reference for peer institutions seeking re-accreditation.

"Completing the Middle States Re-Accreditation Self-Study was an incredible accomplishment that relied on the combined efforts of groups across campus," Dr. Rogers added. "I am grateful for and impressed by the commitment shown by the entire campus in pulling this project together."






