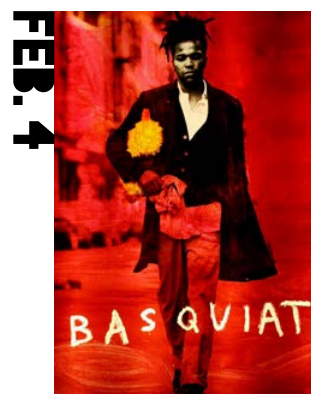

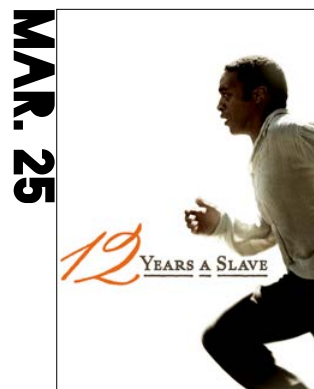

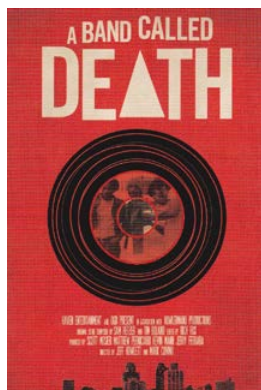

We Gon' Be Alright? Education and Justice in Black America

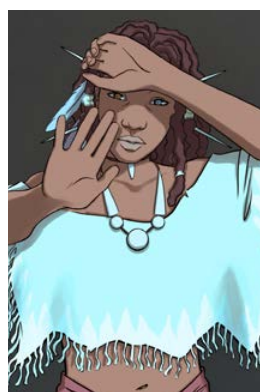

Dr. Carla Shedd, associate professor of sociology and urban education at The Graduate Center, CUNY, uses her scholarship to illuminate the perceptions, experiences and outcomes of black and Latinx youth in urban America. By probing the symbiotic relationship between America's systems of education and criminal justice, Shedd will examine coming of age in an unequal society and why the "carceral continuum" must be countered in order to ensure formative social institutions are carrying out their missions to educate, protect and uplift youth.

The Divide that Destroyed Poughkeepsie: Charting the History and Effects of the Poughkeepsie & Spackenkill School Districts

English Instructor Jordan Bell will discuss how the redistricting of the Poughkeepsie City School District into two separate districts - the Poughkeepsie City School District and the Spackenkill Union Free School District - contributed to racial disparities and an ongoing educational divide illustrated by the widely disparate graduation rates for each district's high school: 96% for Spackenkill, 48% for Poughkeepsie.
